Our programs. Marquette offers 20 doctoral degree, 38 master's degree and more than 10 graduate certificate programs with a variety of specializations to help you tailor the curriculum to your needs.

Our faculty. Marquette's almost 700 full-time faculty represent renowned scholars and industry experts. Why a master's degree in Public Service at Marquette?

With a strong emphasis on social responsibility and civic engagement, our program gives you the skills necessary to effectively and compassionately confront the challenges of today's metropolitan environment and its diverse populations. Marquette's master of arts in public service and its specializations are distinct in the marketplace. Our program focuses on social justice, public policy and regulation in urban governmental environments, unlike the public administration programs offered by most other universities.

Be well-rounded. No other program in the region provides the same link between hands-on professional training in public service with specializations in criminal justice administration, health care, dispute resolution and nonprofit leadership with traditional disciplines such as history and sociology.

Be ethical. Hone and apply ethical decision-making skills to real-life situations as part of every course within the program.

YOUR JOURNEY

Our program helps you make a difference in cities through government and private sector positions, as well as in the rapidly expanding community service sector. You'll immediately apply what you learn on the job because half of your course work is completed in the area that matches your professional interest.

Master of arts in public service

Specializations:

- Criminal justice administration
- Dispute resolution
- Health care administration
- Leadership studies
- Nonprofit sector leadership

Course work:

- Students must complete a minimum of 36 credit hours (12 classes), including:
 - 12 credit hours (four classes) of required core course work.
 - three credit hours (one class) of elective core course work.
 - 15 credit hours (five classes) of specialization course work.
 - one of three six-credit-hour integrated learning options — a professional project, a research article of publishable quality or additional course work followed by a comprehensive exam.
- Required courses include leadership in public service, urban policy and public service administration, ethics in public service, and urban research methods.
- Students must choose one of the five specializations offered.
- Students spend an average of 12 hours a week on course work outside of class for every three-credit course.

Marquette also offers graduate certificate programs in leadership studies, dispute resolution, law enforcement leadership and management, and sports leadership. Find out more at marquette.edu/cps/disputeresolution.

Time to completion:

- Full-time students taking three classes a semester can complete the program in as few as two years.
- Part-time students, on average, complete the program in three to four years.
- Students must complete the program in six years.

Future Milwaukee is a community leadership development program at Marquette. Marquette University

- Access to networking, career counseling, and job searching counselors and seminars through our free Career Services Center

YOUR INVESTMENT

Furthering your education is an investment you can count on. Financial aid — in several forms — can help meet the costs of your graduate education at Marquette.

Tuition*

For full-time students:

Nine credit hours per semester at \$945 per credit = \$8,505 per semester

For part-time students:

Three to six credit hours per semester at \$945 per credit = \$2,835 to \$5,670 per semester

A minimum of 36 credit hours is required to complete the master's program.

*Figures are based on average credit hours taken per semester and exclude service fees and/or continuous enrollment/continuation course fees. Per-credit cost valid until May 2012.

Need-based aid

Enroll as a half- or full-time student in a degree program (at least four credit hours, usually two or more classes a semester), and you may be eligible for loans distributed through the Office of Student Financial Aid. Most student loans have competitive interest rates and do not require repayment until after you complete your course of study.

To apply, file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid each year between January 1 and mid-February. It's available from the Office of Student Financial Aid or at fafsa.ed.gov. Once you have been admitted to your program and completed your financial aid paperwork, we will determine your eligibility and send you a notice explaining what financial aid you are eligible to receive from the university.

Application requirement checklist:

- Online application at marquette.edu/grad (must be submitted online before all other admission materials requested)
- Application fee
- Official transcripts from all current and previous colleges/universities except Marquette
- Three letters of recommendation from professional or academic sources
- Official test scores from the GRE (preferred), GMAT or LSAT; waived if the applicant has an advanced degree (master of arts, master of science, M.B.A., doctorate, juris doctorate or doctor of medicine) from any school
- A statement of purpose
- (International applicants only) TOEFL score or other acceptable proof of English proficiency
- If necessary, submit any additional hard-copy materials in one envelope to:
