Graduation: December, 2010

**** DEADLINE IS NEXT WEEK---OCTOBER 6 ****

If you plan to graduate—you **must apply for graduation**. Receipt of your application for graduation begins the process where your records are audited and a diploma is ordered for you. The important deadlines for students graduating in December are:

- **Wednesday, October 6, 2010:** The deadline to apply for December graduation. Graduate School master's, certificate, and doctoral students apply for graduation online at http://www.marquette.edu/grad/forms_applygraduation.shtml. Graduate School of Management students (accounting, MBA, executive MBA, economics or human resources) apply for graduation online at <http://www.busadm.mu.edu/graduate/graduation.shtml>.
- **Thursday, September 16, 2010:** Outlines (thesis, professional project, and dissertation) due in the Graduate School office for all December graduates.
- **Tuesday, November 16, 2010:** Last day for public defense of dissertation for all December graduates. Announcement of public defense is required 30 days prior to defense. See www.marquette.edu/grad/forms_index.shtml for details.
- **Monday, November 22, 2010:** Final day to submit thesis, professional project or essay to the Graduate School with results and signatures for all December graduates.
- **Monday, November 22, 2010:** Results of comprehensive exams are due in the Graduate School for all December graduates. Registration for and the taking of the comp exams—and the turning in of the results—are all arranged between the student and his/her program or department.
- **Wednesday, December 8, 2010:** Final day to submit dissertation to the Graduate School with results and signatures for all December graduates.

Financial Aid (Merit-Based): Spring, 2010

- **Monday, November 15, 2010:** The deadline to apply for merit-based tuition scholarships, Catholic Schools Personnel Scholarships, Milwaukee Area Teachers Scholarships and graduate assistantships from the Graduate School. 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5. Announcement: Student Ambassador Sought for BloodCenter of Wisconsin

BloodCenter of Wisconsin has a position available for a Marquette Student Ambassador.

Job responsibilities: The focus of this job is working with the MU campus to coordinate and promote blood drives. BCW hosts approximately 20 blood drives each year, working directly with AMU Event Management to secure space and to identify student groups who will help “co-sponsor” the blood drives. The main responsibility is to do everything possible to recruit students, faculty and administration to participate as donors.

Hours for the position will be determined based on the student's school schedule. The job requires 10-20 hours per week; more are available if the student wishes. Blood drives are not booked during finals or mid-terms as a practice because of student academic responsibilities.

Recruiting strategies might include reserving tables at the Union, passing out flyers the day of the drive, creating events on the social media sites, working with sponsoring groups to post flyers and posters and distributing e-mail messages. It might mean attending a hall meeting to discuss the importance of donating blood or educating first-time donors on the process.

Students are given a cell phone, desk and e-mail account at BCW for communication in their role as campus ambassador. The student also works closely with the BCW community liaison to identify new opportunities for groups or sponsors to work with BloodCenter on blood drives.

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7. Financial Aid: P.E.O. Scholar Awards Program for Women

Philanthropic Educational Organization is an organization where women celebrate the advancement of women, educate women through scholarships, grants, awards, loans, and stewardship of Cottey College, and motivate women to achieve their highest aspirations.

P.E.O. Scholar Awards was established in 1991 to provide substantial merit-based awards for women in the United States and Canada who are either pursuing doctoral-level degrees or who are engaged in postdoctoral research at an accredited college, university, or institution.

Award amount: \$15,000

Eligibility: Women must be pursuing doctoral-level degrees or be engaged in postdoctoral research. Their graduation dates must fall between May, 2010 and August, 2013. Applicants must be U.S. or Canadian citizens. Applicants must be enrolled full-time in their programs during their award year.

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8. Financial Aid: Ford Foundation Fellowship Programs

Ford Foundation Fellowships are designed to increase the diversity of the nation's college and university faculties by increasing their ethnic and racial diversity, to maximize the educational benefits of diversity, and to increase the number of professors who can and will use diversity as a resource for enriching the education of all students.

There are approximately 40 predoctoral, 20 dissertation, and 18 postdoctoral fellowships sponsored by the Ford Foundation and are administered by the National Research Council of the National Academies.

Awards are available to U.S. citizens or nationals and range from \$20,000 to \$40,000.

Introducing Mango Online Language Learning System

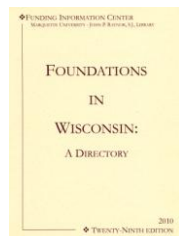
