The Haggerty Museum of Art's collection has been deeply enriched by the vision and generosity of collectors who share the museum's commitment to creating transformational and thought-provoking aesthetic experiences. Dr. Robert and Sharon Yoerg exemplify that commitment. Over a number of years Dr. Yoerg—a Marquette University Medical School

graduate who now practices psychiatry in Belmont, California—and his wife Sharon have donated 88 works on paper to the museum's collection.
