Travel Ban of 2017

- Supreme Court upheld a travel ban from the Trump Administration barring travel from the following countries:
 - Iran
 - Libya
 - Somalia
 - Sudan
 - Syria
 - Chad
 - Yemen
- Trump claimed that the ban was passed to protect the American people from individuals and countries that pose a threat to their safety.
 - Several of countries were removed from the ban after addressing the president's concerns about identity management and security.

Ending DACA

- DACA is a policy instituted by the Obama
Administration that protects immigrants who
arrived in the United States at a young age from
deportation. The only requirement is that they
renew their status as a DACA recipient every two
years, and they receive work permits as well.



 Trump expressed his intent to end the DACA program in 2017 and has fervently fought to do so throughout his administration. On March 6, 2020, the US Supreme Court ruled against the termination of the program.

RAISE Act in 2017

- The Reforming American Immigration for a Strong Economy Act
- This was proposed to limit the number of immigrants allowed in the United States to only those who are highly skilled.
- This act is meant to benefit American workers and the American economy.
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
